Terry Bolin was born in Newcastle and completed his secondary schooling at Hurlstone in 1951. He gained "A" passes in English, Agriculture and Modern History at his Leaving Certificate. Terry played Rugby and was involved in athletics, debating and public speaking. He later represented Australian Universities in Rugby

and Water Polo. He went to Medical School at the University of Sydney qualifying as a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery in 1958. He then qualified as a Doctor of Medicine at the University of New South Wales in 1971 and became a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in Edinburgh in 1983.

He has written a number of books and completed numerous research papers on his specialty of gastroenterology, which is the treatment of the diseases of the digestive organs. He was the Honorary Secretary of The Sydney Gut Club from 1972-1983.

He was a Council Member from 1978- 1980 of the American Gastroenterological Association and Inaugural President in 1983 of The Gut Foundation .

His present position is Associate Professor of Medicine at the University of New South Wales and he is currently working in the Gastrointestinal and Liver Unit at the Prince of Wales Hospital.



Brenton Banfield was a student at HAHS from 1961-1965. His brothers Warwick, Milton and Kendall also attended Hurlstone in the 1960s and 1970s. Brenton died on the 7th November, aged 62, following a long battle with motor neurone disease.

Brenton was elected to council in 1991 and served two terms as mayor, from 2002 to 2005. In total he served on council for seventeen years. He was also a successful solicitor who ran two legal practices in Liverpool and Campbelltown.

Councillor Banfield was well-known for his plan to have a million trees planted in Campbelltown, his transport ideas and his love of the Campbelltown Arts centre.



Current Labor Councillor, Aaron Rule, said Brenton was a great example of public service and public leadership. Mr Banfield is survived by his wife Ruth, two adult sons and four grandchildren.

Student Achievement

Hurlstone's Mock Trial team consisting of :- Avishay Kumar, Emily Cannings, Wendy Tran, Ilesha Bapat, Monica Waters-Neil, Jordan Kerr, Luke Prior, Amy Mathai, Jinan Hammoudi and Ayesha Ardati have performed brilliantly in the 2011 competition. As of writing they have made it to the state final against John Paul Catholic College, Coff's Harbour on December 7th at the Wesley Centre. Along the way they have defeated eleven schools, public and private. This would be the first time Hurlstone has won the highly prestigious competition which attracts over 250 schools yearly.



The following Year 8 students :- Vincent Anthony, Elaine Chua, Elaine Kong, Sowmya Padki, Felicia Tran, Krisha Umali made the Regional final of the Premier's Debating Challenge and were defeated by Prairiewood High School. They defeated seven high schools to make the final.

Christine White of Year 9 reached the final of the NSW Legacy Junior Public Speaking Competition held at the Art Gallery of NSW on Friday Oct 21. Christine's speech *Facebook: The Phenomenon* was polished over a number of weeks. She won the zone final at Sarah Redfern High, the regional final at Lewisham and the State semi held at Parliament House.



Jennifer Han Le (Year 11) attended a prestigious awards ceremony at NSW Parliament House. Jennifer's entry in the annual Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition was amongst the best thirteen Division 1 entries in the competition.

The History of Hurlstone

A regular part of the alumni newsletter is a tidbit from Hurlstone's illustrious and colourful past.

The following is a story from Geoff Kelly 1944-48:-

Many were the great times during our weekly sporting ventures around the Sydney Sporting Fields but a most memorable time was Victory in the Pacific Day signalling the end of the war against Japan. We were able to go into Sydney and join in the excitement of that day. This meant a lot to us as around Hurlstone as we had army camps at



Ingleburn, Glenfield, Moorebank and Holsworthy, while the United States Army Camp was at Warwick Farm. After going to "the pictures" on a Saturday afternoon in Liverpool we walked past three hotels on the way to catch the train back to school. It was great to watch the interaction between the Aussie and Yank soldiers especially after they had had a few beers. They were by no means the friendliest as our men received their "6 bob a day" while the "Yanks" were far better paid and were more of an attraction for the female population. This led to a lot of jealousy and, at times, animosity.
